

Kingdom Seeds What's the Plan? SNA Principles Applied Across Canada

As you drive through a city or across a province, there are times when the Lord opens your eyes to the great spiritual need. Your response may be, "God, with so much need and so much diversity, where do we begin?" Thanks to Send North America (SNA), we have a strategy that helps us answer that question in large and small communities alike.

At the heart of the SNA Strategy is the gathering of local leaders to pray over a specific geographic area and ask the Lord to reveal "dots on the map" where new churches are required. The dots may represent a residential community, language, or people group.

The final City Plan factors the existing evangelical presence and represents the social, language, cultural, and economic diversity of the city. And finally it reveals priority locations where evangelical church plants are most needed.

This strategy has been effectively piloted in our SNA Cities of Toronto, Montréal, Vancouver, Calgary, and Edmonton. Now, CNBC Church Planting and CNBC Missions Mobilization are working together to apply the principles of the SNA Strategy in three additional cities: Ottawa, Winnipeg, and Halifax. These cities will not be official "send cities" but their size and influence are significant.

Ottawa-Gatineau – It was exciting to be in the room with local pastors and leaders to pray over their city and begin identifying where the next church plants need to be. At their first meeting this March, the group initially identified where we and other strong evangelical churches are, where we are already active in planting, and some preliminary "dots" where additional churches are needed.

This group will continue to meet over the coming months to pray together, discover additional church plant needs, seek a united vision from the Lord, and intentionally work together to impact the National Capital Region.

Winnipeg – Work has just begun, but Winnipeg's final City Plan will be added to a larger cooperative effort with Southern Baptist Conventions who neighbour each other along the I-29 corridor as far south as Kansas City. This effort will be fruitful both in developing local synergy and in recruiting new partners who will respond




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to a compelling church planting vision ... not just in Winnipeg, but along the entire corridor.

Halifax – An initial city plan has just been completed that identifies the next 12 priority plants in the Halifax Regional Municipality. This informed vision will enable South Carolina and other partners to join efforts in the most strategic locations. Additionally, it helps us all realize that the task is so much larger than any of us can undertake on our own. We must work together and bring others to the table as well.

A local City Plan reveals communities, languages, and people groups that have no church or need additional churches serving them. It helps to answer the question, "With so much need and potential, where do we begin?" And it helps partners see the larger vision for the area and know where and how best to pray, participate, and provide.

This is encouraging because the SNA City Plan strategy can be duplicated in any geography where local churches are committed to intentionally pray and labour together. For more information on this strategy, contact Dan Morgan or Peter Blackaby.



Olympics opens doors for church planting in Russia

MOSCOW, RU – When International Mission Board (IMB) missionary Kelly Manire arrived home in Moscow after spending two weeks in February at the Sochi Winter Olympics, he came back with a list of about 20 people he had met and befriended. One of them was Lionel, a young writer who also lives in Moscow.

"We just began to chat, and I was able to find out what he values and cherishes. I was able to talk to him about what I cherish and what's dear to me, and how Christ makes all the difference," says Manire.

"Lionel's sort of like a Russian New Ager—'There's got to be something out there to feed our souls, but I'm not sure what that is.' I've met with him here and we're going to continue to meet together. I think over the course of time, we'll be able to have some very specific conversations about Christ. That day is coming."

Manire and his wife, Jeanne, have been ministering in Russia for almost a year. Before that, they had served for 15 years among postsecondary students and young adults across Metro Vancouver and British Columbia, planting several churches in the process.

It was while serving at the 2010 Vancouver Winter Olympics that God began to impress on them a calling to the Sochi Games in 2014. What they did not anticipate was that by then they would actually be living in Russia.

They—along with their son, Matthew—attended the Games as part of an IMB project called Engage Sochi. They joined about 230 Southern Baptist volunteers. "We totally loved every moment of every day that we were there," says Manire.

Even the tight security laid on by Russian authorities to deter any terrorist attacks could not dampen their enjoyment of the event.

"It was kind of intense," he says. "But once you got through their security,

it was just like in Vancouver. There was freedom to walk around and do what you want."

The threat of violence plus the cost of traveling to Sochi still persuaded people from many nations not to attend. The IMB had initially expected 400 Americans and Canadians would volunteer. Yet seemingly no one from a CNBC church chose to go, at least not as missionaries.

But the fact that foreigners stayed away meant that the SBC team was successful in their primary goal of forging relationships with Russians and especially the people of Sochi. Unlike the Vancouver Games, where the emphasis was on mass evangelism and hospitality, the emphasis in Sochi was less on the event itself but on church planting. In fact, the IMB's first church planting couple arrived there three years ago.

"Our target was not necessarily the people who had come from around the world for the Games—although that was a focus—but we really wanted to engage the people of the city with the gospel," says Engage Sochi co-director Marc Ira Hooks, who is based in Vienna.

That said, volunteers handed out about 17,000 pins designed to start a conversation about Christianity as well as full-gospel tracts in Russian and English.

"One of the things we tasked our volunteers with," says Hooks, "was, 'Don't just give out a pin and a gospel tract. We want you to have conversations and to go deep enough with people to where they would feel comfortable to give you their contact information."

The Manires themselves gave away more than 400 pins. "Just like the More Than Gold pins at the Vancouver Olympics, they worked like a charm," says Manire.

The net result was volunteers led three people to Christ, while more than 130 indicated a desire to learn more. Hooks is hopeful this is just the beginning.

"We're going to continue to engage the people of Sochi, meet them where they are, talk to them about the gospel, hopefully make new disciples, and move those disciples into groups of believers that we call churches," he says.

While Russia remains his mission field, Manire says he would "absolutely love" to go to the next Olympics events— Brazil in 2016 and South Korea in 2018. And if they are allowed to go, he hopes next time it will be as Canadian citizens.

get started. The day of the week and time are your choice.


My hope and prayer is that God uses this study to thrust us deeper into His Word together. I

God is working in Cuba

Roland and Shirley Shum joined with 13 others from across Canada for a vision trip to Cuba. The Shums share some of their reflections of the trip here. Roland is pastor of Evangel Baptist Church, Edmonton, AB.

Shirley Shum's Cuba Reflections

The recent Cuba Vision Trip Pastor Roland and I went on was an eye opening experience for both of us. Within a week's time, we visited seven churches and seven mission fields in Santiago and its vicinity.

We, North American Christians, are living in an affluent world where we have almost everything materially, perhaps much more than we need, but we might still be poor spiritually.

Many of the pastors, missionaries and Christians whom we met in South East Cuba touched our hearts. They are poor materially and yet they seem rich spiritually.

Pastors live on a monthly salary of 20-25 CUC, which is equivalent to US dollars, and missionaries only live on 12 CUC per month. Despite the limited resources they have on hand, their focus is still on planting churches, and setting up more mission sites so that more people can hear the good news and be discipled.

They are full of vision, passion and yet,

without the adequate resources, it can be challenging for them to put some ministries into action.

If we North American Christians are willing to help them out with more resources, the Kingdom of God can be even more quickly and effectively expanded; more pastors and missionaries will be trained. Their human resources will be focused on evangelizing, discipleship training, mentoring, and doing more mission work rather than problem solving.

Are we willing to take part in the spiritual revival in Cuba by sharing our abundant resources with our Cuban brothers and sisters?

Pastor Roland Shum's Cuba Reflections

My wife, Shirley, and I have been sharing our Cuban experience with different congregations since we returned from our March trip. It might be hard for some to fully understand what it was like until they see it with their own eyes. Obviously, there is no point in comparing Canada and Cuba because they are so different. And yet, I cannot help to reflect more on the spirit and



mentality that may become an inspiration and challenge to what it means to be a church. Generally speaking, based on our observations, the Christians

and churches there have few possessions, so they have not much to lose. They see more of what they receive as gifts from God, so they have a free spirit of giving and sharing—many homes are

open for ministry purposes.

To them, prayer is their core ministry and lifestyle. Their mentality is to reach out to the lost and start missions in their neighborhood even when they are so lacking of resources.

There are many laypersons who rise up to be equipped and get trained to further the gospel ministry.

They tend to think of potential ministry opportunities and many of them sacrificially lay down their lives for the Lord.

No wonder the Lord has blessed Cuban churches with great harvest:

Fourty percent of the population are Christians in a Communist country and thousands of new churches and missions have been planted in the past two decades!

Let us re-think and reflect on what it means to be a Christ-follower and what it means to be a church. Are we willing to serve, give and participate sacrificially?

As a young child, my parents bought a travel trailer. But before they could bring it home, we needed to create a parking pad. Digging out and levelling a space for a 7.6 m trailer was no small feat, especially considering we were squeezing this parking stall into a city lot that needed to drop by almost a metre. I remember watching as neighbours from up and down the block would show up with shovels and picks in hand. Without the help of these neighbours, it would have been an insurmountable task. But working hard together, we finally had a place for our new family home on wheels.

The same can be true in the life of a church or church plant. There are certain times when we need to call upon friends and extended family to help. Extra hands may be needed for a one-time outreach event or a week-long summer program. But where do we start in asking for help? The following are a couple of ideas of how you can share your need and potentially recruit help.

START LOCAL: If we help you, can you help us? Every church probably has a few projects in a year where they require additional help to accomplish. If your church does not have an ongoing partnership with another church, this would be a great opportunity to potentially involve other churches in your immediate area. One approach would be to ask the pastor or a ministry leader in a nearby CNBC church, "If we help you with a project this summer, can you help us with one as well?"

For example, a Calgary area church may approach a sister church and ask, "If we sent 10 volunteers to help with your Canada Day celebration, could you send 10 volunteers to help with our Stampede Barbecue a week later?" Not only does this provide extra hands for a needed task, but it also helps relationally connect two churches that are already ministering in relative close proximity.

SHARE WITH THE EXTENDED FAMILY:

Post the need – A new **website** has been created that will allow CNBC churches to post a need or search for one time mission opportunities across the CNBC and amongst our larger Southern Baptist family in the United States.

Go to cnbcpartners.com and click on the "Click Here" link in the first paragraph.

If a church is able to respond to your need, be sure not to miss the potential for an ongoing relationship – encouraging each other throughout the following year through intentional prayer. And, if the task this church helped you accomplish is an annual need, you may have found a great long-term partner with whom you can reciprocate.

The Importance of Registering Your Charity



With a convention goal of 1000 churches by 2020, we are always excited to get "birth announcements" from our church planting team. It's not about the number but rather the thought that lives will be changed in communities across Canada because of this church plant and its ministry.

In Canada the federal government allows for churches to register for charitable status for the purpose of advancing religion. In this article we address the question of why our church plants should register for charitable status.

Some reasons for seeking charitable status are:

- · Charities are exempt from paying tax.
- Charities can offer donors tax relief by issuing official donation receipts to reduce income tax payable for an individual or corporate donor.
- Charities are considered "qualified donees" and therefore can receive funding from other registered charities.
- Registered charities are more "credible" as they must follow rules and guidelines to maintain their status.
- Charities are exempt from GST/HST on goods and services provided and can claim rebates on GST/HST that they pay.

Each year in Canada there are billions of dollars given to charities and donors receive tax relief for such gifts. For some donors this does not necessarily equate to the reason they give but in all cases the legitimacy of the organization is enhanced with the knowledge that the organization is registered and able to accept these gifts. The official donation receipt issued by the charity is a benefit the charity can offer to the donor.

In order for a church to receive funding from another charitable organization, it must be a registered charity. When the convention receives funding for our church plants, we can only send it along for processing to a church that is also a registered Canadian charity. If the new church is not registered, we must work with the registered sponsoring or mother church to process funding. In the past we used the term "mission church" and some of our churches that birthed churches years ago continue to experience the birth of children, grandchildren and even great grandchildren. The role of the "parent" church is extremely important and will be discussed in a future article.


I preached from Colossians 1:15-23, 2:6-23 with the theme: 'The Superior Saviour.' In attendance were 16 Africans and 16 existing church members. One man (NN) and his family from Sudan joined the church and after the close of the service we were all headed to a potluck dinner.

I spotted five potential leaders among the Africans and I called them to a meeting in the evening at the pastor's office. All of them attended and (NN) from Sudan gave his life to Christ after a clear and simple presentation of the gospel message. Three other people decided to join the church with their family; (BR) from Ghana and (FK) from Sudan, and (GG) from DRC Congo. Pastor Bob and I prayed for them and we departed. From the meeting, the African brothers and I went to visit two families from Ghana and they also decided to join the church.

The next morning, before leaving, Pastor Bob and I visited the multicultural center for refugees in Moose Jaw. I interacted with many African brothers and sisters who are known by the pastor's wife, Laura— she is a teacher at the multicultural center. Several we visited said they would like to join a church. I have been communicating with them ever since I came back to school

I had the chance to experience God's grace and love for his people in Moose Jaw. God had already been putting pieces together to bring about His purpose in peoples' lives there. It was a great challenge to me that I could be a blessing to the church and the people in Moose Jaw. I pray that God will show me what He has for me in ministering to my people who are now in Canada.

Many visits can be characterized by relationship-building groundwork. Even at those times, churches and students happen upon special experiences that encourage one another. On this occasion Pastor Bob and Laura's extensive efforts of visiting and previous building of relationships set the stage for quite a dramatic weekend with Isaac. We praise God for the outcome of this visit.

From an atheist to a disciple-maker

In 1954, Mr. Baiyin Yang and his wife Mrs. Fen Lv were born in northeast China. They grew up as atheists. At age 22, Mr. Yang lost his father who was persecuted to death in the Cultural Revolution; at age 35, he lost his mother; at age 48, he miraculously survived a pulmonary embolism. After high school, his only child came to Canada to study. For more than a decade, Mr. Yang and his wife felt very lonely especially during the Spring Festival (Chinese New Year), which like Christmas or Thanksgiving in North America is a holiday of family reunions. Mr. Yang had, through the years, accumulated much bitterness and hatred. Last year, he and his wife came to Canada for the first time to visit their son.

On a Sunday last September, they visited Truth Chinese Baptist Church.

At nearly 60 years of age, it was their first time to attend a worship service and to hold a Bible. As they watched Christians worship together and listened to worship songs, their hearts were deeply touched. The first sermon they heard was a message from Ephesians. They were so amazed that though the Bible has thousands of years of history, it still speaks relevantly to today's life. Soon after, they joined a Bible study group. Through studying the Bible, they became followers of Christ.

On February 22, 2014, they were baptized together. Even before then, they had already begun to share the gospel with neighbours and to care for other seniors who had also come to Canada as visitors. After their baptism, they not only continued to reach out, but they also joined the church cleanup team and the team to welcome new visitors. Now they

City-wide night of worship draws Richmond-area youth

VANCOUVER, BC—Pastor Garrett Holmes of Towers Baptist Church in Richmond, BC, has a heart for the teenagers in his community. He volunteers as a basketball coach in a local school, and through those connections Holmes has noticed that a few of the kids in the schools go to church, but they do not know each other.

He began to pray about a vision he had to gather three or four local churches and expected to have 30 to 40 teenagers and university students from local youth groups attend. He wanted to get them together for a city-wide night of worship and a chance to connect so they would know they were not alone on their campuses.

Holmes and other local leaders put together the youth event with the help of a mission team from Lake Mead Christian Academy in Henderson (Las Vegas), Nevada. It was their third year in a row to come on their spring break to help Towers Baptist and the Richmond Church Planting Network.

The event was held at Towers Baptist Church on Friday, March 7. By the end of the evening, 123 people, representing 14 churches from the Vancouver Lower Mainland, had gathered. They worshipped through song, prayer, painting, writing and other types of art. Holmes, knowing that many were new to church, passionately shared a gospel message about the cross of Jesus Christ.

"I wanted them to know how excited I was that they were all here together and how blown away I was that this night was happening." Holmes said. "However, I made it very clear that I am even more excited and more blown away that God loved me and them enough that He would send Jesus to die in my place and in their place too. I pray that they clearly heard how much Jesus loves them and how much we care for them too."

Holmes added, "I usually do not get nervous when I preach, but there was a point I had to go into my office while they were singing and just pray. I was overwhelmed and nervous to preach to that group of students. It was an amazing night."

Also, the group collected many items for homeless ministries. Everyone that registered for the event was entered to win a prize, but if they brought donations they received extra entries. A young unchurched girl won the prize and all stayed around to fellowship and connect around pizza and pop.

The CNBC Youth Team provided a grant to help with this associational youth event.

Ray Woodard, Vancouver Send City coordinator, said "It was good to see the combined work of several churches provide such a great evening for young people to invite friends to hear the gospel." He enjoyed observing

the Christian young people surrounded by their non-Christian friends they had invited.

He shared that his excitement for the night was topped off when he saw a familiar face from several years ago. She was surrounded by her family and eating pizza.

Woodard said, "I walked over to reacquaint myself and ask what brought them that night. She beat me to the punch saying, 'Apparently your grandson is a friend of my daughter and he invited her.' It was a good evening."

Conrad Au, CNBC youth catalyst, said, "When we gather all our youth in our WestCoast Baptist churches together annually for our Rock Solid rally, we desire to empower our pastors, youth pastors and leaders to do the same for their youth and their community. It's awesome to see Garrett at Towers serving God in such way for Richmond."

Holmes concluded, "God has given me a huge burden for the city of Richmond and I know that this generation is going to play a huge part in bringing the gospel to this city. We have to share the gospel with them first, let God work and then disciple and train them. Please pray for our city!"

Richmond Hill Baptist Church celebrates freedom from bank debt

CALGARY, AB—On January 26, Richmond Hill Baptist Church symbolically placed their mortgage note in a water pail and burned it into ashes. A service of rejoicing in the goodness of the Lord surrounded the milestone.



Catherine Schmidt led the congregation to recall with joy the pilgrimage of the church from its beginnings to the exciting moment of being debt free and enjoying and ministering in their wonderful facility. Dr. Shane Spannagel, senior pastor, called all to commitment to the ministries of today and the future that God has planned for Richmond Hill Baptist Church.

Twenty-nine founding members of the congregation were presented to the church and honoured for their faithfulness to God's will in the life of the church. Former church members traveled to participate in the day's celebrations.

Only God knew from the beginning that the 19-year story of that church would see such remarkable progress by 2014. The small group of 36 dedicated Baptists, the total membership of the church in 1998 who signed off on the multi-million dollar building project that year, surely had little financial ability.

Financial records from 1998 include a comment by an official auditor stating that "this is a small congregation that cannot possibly meet their financial obligations and dreams." Yet they had enormous faith that God would carry the building to completion and the debt fully paid.

None recall believing that they would "burn" their note five years before the actual bank arrangement, thus saving a great amount of money for ministry in God's Kingdom. However, each year the congregation sets aside a Sunday to focus on the blessing of sacrificial giving. That annual "Miracle Sunday" with its emphasis on serving God with financial and other resources has led the church to rejoice in what God can do when every individual and family does their part.

The church website recalls the 1995 beginnings of a dream of a Baptist church by three Baptist "lay-families" who had already helped plant new churches in other parts of Calgary. They dreamed of a Baptist church which would minister to the rapidly growing Calgary-southwest and located near the new West Hills and Signal Hill shopping centres.

By 1996 they had organized for the task and formed a church partnered with the Baptist Union of Western Canada, purchased two acres of prime property, and drawn architectural plans for a building to accommodate 600 people. However, financing and organizational problems nipped at the dream for two years.

In 1998 the church reorganized and sought membership with the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists, now called the CNBC. Several families from CCSB-related churches joined with their small but determined "dream team" in 1998, still meeting in a Catholic elementary school on Richmond Road.

From the school, the church moved into one of the movie theatres in the West Hills cinema complex. The members



at that time still remember that the first worship Sunday was held in the theatre that would, that day, show the movie "Titanic"! The church would finally take possession of their own new building in November, 1999.

On August 1, 1998, the church called Dr. Allen Schmidt as their senior pastor. Schmidt took retirement from his position as the executive director of the Canadian Convention of Southern Baptists and led the church through their first four-and-ahalf years of organizing for evangelism and discipleship, financial planning, and the great task of seeing the building project from a deep "hole in the ground" through to one of the finest and most functional buildings among CNBC-related churches.

In March, 2003, Dr. Schmidt "retired" once again and the church called Dr. Shane Spannagel as pastor. Spannagel has now led the church for 11 years of growth in spiritual maturity, outreach, national and international ministry, and financial progress. The multi-ethnic congregation continues to look toward the future under the Lordship of Christ.

Family's faith grows while launching church in Vancouver

VANCOUVER (BP)—Billed as North America's most diversity-dense city, Vancouver, British Columbia, boasts 200 language groups among its population of 2.3 million. Naturally, this Canadian region, which includes nearby Vancouver Island, has become a strategic city for the North American Mission Board's Send North America church planting initiative.

In the shadow of this towering urban melting pot, across the Strait of Georgia, sits the picturesque seaside town of Sidney, a year-round tourist destination known for its fishing and natural scenery.

"Most people here are enamored by the natural beauty of creation but reject the Creator. We are working hard to help people connect the Creator with His creation," says NAMB church planter Matthew Bond.

Less than 2 percent of Vancouver Island claimed Christianity on a 2011 census, and 40 percent claimed "no religion."

Bond and his wife Heather and their two teenage sons Ethan and Joseph landed in Sidney in 2012 to plant Ekklesia Church. In less than a year, they established a thriving congregation and have branched out to planting additional churches across the island, which claims a population of 770,000.

"We have wonderful conversations beginning with God," Bond says, "but when the conversation turns to Jesus the people become defensive and turn away. We are definitely not in the Bible Belt anymore!

"Another challenge is the beauty of the island and the lifestyle of islanders. It's hard to convince people that they need God when life seems so good."

The Bonds' church planting journey began in their home state of Tennessee, where Bond taught at a local junior high school as well as in a Sunday school class at their church.

"As I grew spiritually," Bond says, "a friend challenged me to open my Christian worldview to actually include the world. This process led my wife and I to sell everything and move our family to Fort Worth, Texas, to attend Southwestern [Baptist Theological Seminary]."

Soon after, a professor informed Bond of a seminary evangelism course that would take place in Vancouver, so he signed up.

"When I returned from Vancouver," Bond recalls, "I could not stop thinking and talking about Vancouver and the trip."

As he and Heather talked and prayed about God's leading, they decided to take a family trip to explore the region and discuss opportunities with other church planters.

As time passed, the Bonds were convinced God was calling them to Vancouver.

"One important point about our church planting adventure is that our whole family is called to this wonderful adventure with God. This is our family mission calling, not just mine," Bond says.

"My prayer was for God to call us as a family and for each of us to find a special place within God's plan to serve. God affirmed this when Ethan, my 15-yearold, came home and announced he had signed me up to coach volleyball and soccer at his new school. He understands the value of building relationships through building community with others.

"Another great example is when Joseph, my 13-year-old son, shared the gospel with a kid at school after the kid told Joseph he was going to hell. These are the moments, plus many others, that God affirms our calling, and these are the stories we hold on to when we face spiritual warfare and discouragement. We are here for God's glory and not our own."

From the beginning, Bond says they saw God's hand in planting Ekklesia Church.

"We planted Ekklesia in a very unique way that brought with it different rewards and challenges," Bond says.

A group of about 40 Christians, who had been displaced from a church that closed its doors, contacted a NAMB representative for help in planting a new church. Bond accepted the challenge from NAMB and began planting Ekklesia. It was a challenge they took on "without following any of the church planting models found in the textbooks," Bond says.

"We began meeting with this group of 40, teaching them about church planting, the vision God gave me, the *Baptist Faith and Message*, and our views on doctrine, evangelism, and missions," Bond says. "We spent three and a half months meeting, teaching, worshipping and fellowshipping.

"During this time, we lost some of that original 40, and we gathered new people. In December 2012, we held a commitment service when 37 people chose to commit to being a part of Ekklesia and spreading the gospel in Sidney."

Since then, Ekklesia has grown to a regular attendance of 50-60 people. They added children's Sunday school and an active youth group with about 10 teenagers. They also have six home Bible study groups.

Alberta students refuel, recharge, refocus

A group of young people from our CNBC churches were inspired by experiences they shared with young adults in Cuba. Alicia Chung, Sara Ruiz and Wayne Hoover also recognized an opportunity to raise some funds to support the work that is being done among young people by our brothers and sisters in Cuba. An idea born in the hearts of several last August, in the delightful town square of Bayamo, Cuba, came to fruition on February 14 through 17.

Sixty students from about a dozen CNBC affiliated churches gathered for "RE:" a time to refuel, recharge, refocus. That is, they had a retreat.





Crowsnest Lake Bible Camp provided affordable and delightful accommodations and food. Calvin Poon handled worship with a team of volunteers and Dr. Glenn Watson from the Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary brought us teaching from the Bible on what it is to follow God.

Lives were changed, hearts were touched and friendships strengthened, all of which a retreat ought to bring about.

Students did what students do: they went skiing, they climbed the 20-foot indoor wall, they toured a legendary candy store and bought 4-pound gummy bears, they engaged in snowball fights and played life-sized Dutch Blitz.

Christians did what Christians do: they sang praises to our God, they devoured the Word, they prayed to our God.

God did what God does; and the people remembered why it is good to be in love with our great God! The overwhelming response from the feedback received was that we ought to do this again and we intend to.

In an offering taken at the camp four-hundred dollars was raised to support outreach to Cuba and several hundred more was contributed to the same goal from the surplus money from camp registration.

Family's faith grows while launching church in Vancouver

Recently, sparks of revival and awakening have caught fire, Bond says. The congregation has seen three people place their faith in Christ along with "seeing a spiritual awakening among many senior adult Christians in the church, many that are praying aloud and sharing their faith with others for the first time."

As part of their church planting strategy, Bond challenges church members to give themselves away, noting that they want "to send people out to plant new works where the gospel is not being proclaimed. We are currently working diligently toward creating a strong core church in order to celebrate the sending of people to reach people with the gospel in communities where truth is not proclaimed."

The church has started a home discipleship group in a community 20 minutes South of Sidney, where church members who live in the area are building relationships and studying the Bible with non-Christians.

"We are praying that God will take this group and build our first daughter church

in Brentwood Bay," Bond says, adding, "and then keep moving down the peninsula, planting new groups in communities until we work all the way down and then all the way up the island."

As their family continues to serve in Vancouver, they remain anchored in the God who called them to this geographically beautiful but spiritually dark region.

"I love church planting because there are no safety nets to catch us," Matthew says.

"Our dependence, faith, and trust in God has grown exponentially."

Thanks a Million, South Asia!!

Canada has been blessed with more than a million people who have come from South Asian nations, primarily India, Pakistan and Bangladesh. Especially in our major cities, like Toronto, Vancouver and Calgary, South Asians are our neighbors, fellow-workers and fellow citizens. They contribute in many wonderful ways to make Canada a vibrant, prosperous nation.

While most South Asians here speak English, they also are usually fluent in their own language (like Punjabi or Gujarati) and their national language (Hindi for Indians, Urdu for Pakistanis) as well.

South Asians are often more religious than other Canadians—(only four percent have no religious affinity compared with 17 percent of our general population). Most are Sikhs (35 percent), then Hindus (28 percent), then Muslims (17 percent) then Christian (16 percent).

Another related fact about this group in Canada is that the majority ethnic South Asian groups here (about 35 percent) are "Punjabis." But in India, Punjabis are actually only three percent of the

The most unreached people group in North America, the Québécois, is within our own country. What are we as Canadian National Baptists doing about it?

At the 2013 annual CNBC meeting, Engage Québec was launched with prayer needs and practical or financial needs being shared on the Engage Québec display board. population! Likewise, Christians make up only three percent of the population in India, but approximately 16 percent of the South Asians here are Christian. About half of the Christians are Catholic and the other half protestant (including Orthodox and Evangelical/ Pentecostals).*

We are thankful in the CNBC to have

some of these fantastic South Asians represented in our churches and also in Prabhu Yeshu Satsangs (fellowships of the Lord Jesus) throughout Canada. CNBC representatives in Surrey, BC, Paul and Nancy Ingold, met Satish and Rama Kumar several years ago and the couples have worked together to start one "Jeewan Jyoti" (light of life) Punjabi Satsang that meets every Sunday evening at Royal Heights Baptist in neighboring Delta. Satish and Rama, originally
