Why give to North American missions?

astors and leaders of churches are constantly being asked to give to multiple ministries that do mission projects in Canada and all over the world. The increase in charitable organizations doing good mission work around the world is staggering and an indication that the Christian church is taking the needs in our world seriously. Churches and leaders are obliged to make hard decisions on what offerings to participate in and how to invest their limited missions funds.

Therefore it is critical for every church to consider why

they are giving to each of their designated missions causes. CNBC special offerings are effective and productive ways to invest in missions to extend the Kingdom of God.

Let's look at the North American Mission Offering* (NAMO). This is typically taken around Easter or contributed to as part of the combined Global Mission Offering

when churches have their annual missions emphasis.

When CNBC churches give to NAMO* the funds collected go to the North American Mission Board (NAMB) to help plant churches all over North America. In 2015 CNBC churches gave over \$86,000 to North American Missions.

- · Because our churches give to this offering we are partnered with NAMB and receive from them more than 1.5 million dollars every year to help start new CNBC churches and reach people across Canada with the Gospel.
- NAMB funds 18** missionaries, whose primary purpose is to help church planters start CNBC churches across Canada.

- Along with this funding, NAMB invests a substantial amount in church planting projects that assess, train, support and empower our CNBC church planters to start new healthy, sustainable churches.
- NAMB also coordinates a partnership network called Send North America, which in turn provides help and even more funding, focusing on the five largest cities in Canada.

Last year 36 new CNBC churches were started in partner-

ship with the North American Mission Board. In the last five years, 146 new churches were added to our CNBC family.

Your church's giving to this missions cause-whether you give through the North American Mission Offering around Easter or the combined annual Global at another time of year—launches a partnership that multiplies your giving

entrally and conveniently located in Charlottetown, the capital city of Prince Edward Island (PEI), Community Baptist Church has had the privilege, for many years, of being PEI's Regional Collection Centre for the Operation Christmas Child annual shoebox campaign.

This has given the church a tremendous opportunity to reach out into the community as well as to work cooperatively across denominational boundaries with other Christians and churches across the Island. In addition, the church has had opportunities to connect with the business community, organizations, and government offices as well as individuals who pack shoeboxes.

What a joy it is, during November's collection week, to warmly welcome individuals, families, churches and organizations as they bring their packed shoeboxes through the church doors to be cased up and sent on for distribution.

Spending approximately \$20 to \$30 to fill a shoebox with practical and fun gifts for children in need around the world is a fairly easy "sell" with broad appeal. But what really creates excitement for our church family is the tremendous

Gospel outreach opportunitiy this provides, both locally and worldwide.

With each shoebox that is given out—over 700,000 per year from Canada and over 5,000 this year from little PEI alone—children, wherever possible, are also offered an excellent, appealing Gospel presentation booklet, *The Greatest Gift*, in their own language. They are given the opportunity to come back and take a 12-lesson Bible study/

discipleship program, taught by trained church personnel. In countries that received shoeboxes from Canada in 2014, over 77,000 children who took the course trusted in Jesus as their Saviour!

It is a privilege to be able to include as part of Community's church missions outreach the opportunity to serve in this ministry which is opening doors in previously unreached areas, bringing millions of children to the Lord, growing churches (as children come and then bring their families), and leading to many new church plants. In doing so, our church is able to stand as a beacon of light within our wider community. Praise God!

Partnership Momentum

any years ago, I was on staff at Trinity Baptist Church in Calgary when we felt called to start Southwinds Church in the growing south end of the city. As a church of about 180 people, this would be a near impossible feat to accomplish on our own. However, God was gracious and He brought 10 churches alongside to help.

These churches ranged from a megachurch in South Carolina to a small church in Hawai'i. Some churches sent financial support, some sent volunteers at strategic times, some included our leaders in their training, and all prayed regularly with us.

Seven years later, Southwinds has now become a sending church itself. They are fewer than 100 people, but with the help of many supporting churches, they launched their first church plant this past summer.

Every church plant needs a "sending church" who will take primary responsibility for the church plant until it is sustaining. And every church plant needs many "supporting churches" who will come alongside to assist through praying, providing, and/or participating.

I have been encouraged to see the number of sending and supporting churches increasing across the country. I have especially been encouraged to see more Canadian churches engaging in both capacities.

The momentum of partnership has significantly increased this year.

HIGH POINTS FROM 2015:

- In the US and Canada 400+ churches are in longterm partnerships with CNBC church plants across Canada.
- In Greater Toronto alone, 55 churches began partnerships this year.
- First Baptist Church Norfolk, Virginai, came on as a Lead Partner and advocate for Send Edmonton.
- The Baptist General Convention of Oklahoma has begun a multi-year partnership with Edmonton.
- Many former church plants have begun to multiply, planting their first church this year. These include Church on the Rock (Vancouver), Southwinds Church (Calgary), and La Chapelle (Montréal).

God is doing incredible things as our churches, big and small, work together from sea to sea to sea. And as exciting as this past year was, I believe that the best is yet to come!

Upasana Nepalese Church hosts over 100 at two-day Christmas outreach event

LETHBRIDGE, AB—The Upasana Nepalese Church in Lethbridge, AB, is not quite a year old. It began last year as a house church in the home of Pastor Dhan Gajmer. They began reaching the Bhutanese and Nepalese speaking refugees who have been relocated to Canada.

This small house church outgrew Pastor Dhan's home and is now meeting at a local Salvation Army church building. Now that they have an established time and place to meet, Pastor Dhan decided to conduct a Christmas event to reach out to the other Nepalese-speaking refugees in the Lethbridge area.

With the help of CNBC and two grants from church planting and community evangelism, Pastor Dhan's small church of 25 rented a local community hall to hold a Nepalese Christian outreach. They brought two evangelists from the States to preach, one from Atlanta and another from Kansas City. They also brought in local musicians for the two-day family Christian worship and preaching event.

The outreach went very well. Well over 100 Nepalesespeaking people attended both days. There was much preaching, singing, praying, folk dancing and, of course, lots of eating.

People came to Lethbridge from as far away as Calgary and Medicine Hat. Many first-time visitors attended the two-day conference. In the end, there were several who made professions of faith in Christ and others indicated that they would like to become involved with this new church.

We praise God for godly men and visionaries like Pastor Dhan Gajmer who are willing to serve the Lord wherever God has them living. We also want to thank the CNBC family of churches and supporters who are willing to offer help and encouragement to these new church plants. Pray for Pastor Dhan and the Upasana Nepalese Church in Lethbridge that they will continue to preach the good news of Christ to those living in their area.

Review of Church Planting in 2015



Another area of growth is our church planting network in the Greater Toronto Area (GTA). The picture with this article shows their Christmas banquet. All but one of the couples in the picture are planting new churches in the metropolitan area of Toronto.

We are also excited at the diversity of people groups being reached. This year, in different parts of Canada, we have planted churches that reach Nigerians, Congolese, Ghanaians, Sudanese, Bhutanese, Nepalese, South Asians, and several different groups of First Nations. We also planted our first Portuguese-speaking congregation



(non-Brazilian) and are in process of planting a church to reach French-speaking Acadians.

Finally, our church plants are starting daughter churches, many before they are five years old. One example is Next Gen Church. Planter Sam Woo Kim was trained and is now sponsored by The Point, a church plant that meets on the campus of Simon Fraser University.

Some of our older churches are joining in this movement to become a multiplying church. Currently we have a dozen or so Multiplying Church Centres across Canada: churches who mentor and train future church planters, then fund them in a church plant.

Let us rejoice together at what God has done this past year, then join in praying for even greater things as God's Spirit works through us in 2016 to extend the Kingdom and push back spiritual darkness.

Twelve Days of Christmas in Iraq

During the 12 days of Christmas, ROOTS, the English congregation of Truth Baptist, Calgary, sent a team to northern Iraq to work with refugee families. Many thanks to Canadian Global Response (CGR) who made it happen.

Last June, Abraham Shepherd, director of CGR, challenged ROOTS to be the first CNBC congregation to help Iraqi refugees. He also told us he'd never seen a Chinese ministry team in the Middle East. We asked ourselves, why not be the first?

That started a dream for ROOTS, whose motto is "a safe place to search and stretch and give ourselves away". Abraham suggested we go to Erbil, capital of the Kurdistan region of northeast Iraq. It was the locus for tens of thousands of Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) who fled to the city when their communities were overrun by the Islamic terrorist army ISIS.

I asked ROOTS to seek God's direction. Four volunteered, Xiao Chen, Li Chen, Shelley Liu and Thomas Zhang. Two CGR workers also joined us, Sara Ruiz and Dan Kazmaier. A team of seven: the perfect number. Together we spent Christmas in Erbil, a city of 1.6 million.

Our purpose was twofold, to show compassion to the IDPs in refugee camps in and around Erbil and to encourage the Baptist church in the city. God allowed us to do both.

The Baptist church, led by S, a former Iraqi solder, and his wife M, is deeply involved in refugee ministry. Because of their rapport with camp leaders, we were able to access eight refugee camps, a remarkable entrée. The IDPs have been in temporary shelters for a year and a half. Their present is dire; their future is bleak. Men are unemployed. Children no longer attend school. There's no certainty they'll return to their homes. They have a warehouse existence.

The ROOTS team ran activities for 1,500 children in the camps. Thanks to CGR funding, we delivered Christmas presents to the children. We also distributed diapers, baby formula and other goods that CGR provided to refugee families. Students and adults from the church worked with us. We experienced the family of God, crossing ethnic and language barriers. None of our team spoke Arabic, but love is a language and we're fluent in it.

Our team admired the congregation's dedication and courage. We worshipped with them on two Sundays and on Christmas Day, leading music, sharing testimonies and preaching. We organized a youth event for students. We blessed them; they blessed us.

Seasoned traveller blessed by trip to Iraq

Since I was 16, I have loved to travel. I experience independence and freedom. I meet with people, learn their culture, expand my horizons and discover who I am.

Last December, I volunteered to go with Canadian Global Response and my church, ROOTS, on my first mission trip to Iraq. It was an amazing trip, the best of all my travels.

The trip gave an added dimension to my travels. The Great Commission implies that if we're going to share the Gospel with the world, we must pack our bags and leave home. I was in good spirits during this trip because I was working in the Kingdom of God. I pleased him by doing what he wants me to do.

It enriched me to work with the local people. During my other travels, I normally go to tourist sites. This trip allowed me to have a meaningful local and cultural experience. For example, we ate homemade food at our friends' home. We built a strong bond with Iraqi locals, across cultural and racial lines. People were not only nice; many were extremely hospitable.

I had to overcome my fears. Going to a Middle Eastern war zone sounds intimidating but with a team of Christians and by devoting myself to work, I forgot my fears. One Sunday I told my story to an Iraqi church. With Paul's encouragement, we did a good job.

I'd never have the experience of visiting a refugee camp without the church's influence. We went to eight camps

during the trip, playing, dancing and giving gifts to the children.

I learned so much from our team, especially from experienced workers like Paul, Sara and Dan. I was inspired by their hard work, caring spirit and devotion to God. I'm humbled by the deep connection

Quebec family visit their sponsored refugee family in Jordan for Christmas

JORDAN—(Dec. 2015) Their two little girls, ages four and five, don't want toys or dolls for Christmas; they simply want to come live in Canada. The request to sponsor this family has already been approved by the Quebec government, now it remains in the hands of the Jordanian government to give the green light. The Christmas wish from the Barbar family is simple enough, "That the good Lord helps us" explained Raed and his wife, Juliette.

The same story repeats itself for hundreds of Iraqi refugee families who have been living in the poorer areas of Amman, Jordan, for over a year.

Here's an opportunity to meet a couple who have been sponsored by a church in Laval, Quebec, since 2014. Everything is authorized; they even had their interview and medical

exams last March in Amman. Since then nothing, they sit waiting for the call.

The McLean family organized a Christmas gathering for over 100 people in Amman. The Canadians had gifts for all of the children and **Canadian Global Response** provided everyone with a Christmas meal.

The Mcleans didn't have much to say about their longawaited visit at the Canadian embassy. "We went there very hopeful to speak with Canadian authorities to find out

the embassy's website. It is unfortunate for the families who find themselves lost in the system when they know very well Canada has made steps to help them," explains Paul McLean.

The next week, the McLeans found themselves in the less fortunate areas of Amman where many of the Iraqi Christian refugees live. They met with the Marzena family who appear in the photo below.

"While drinking tea with them they told us their story.

They fled Iraq in August 2014 when the mortar attacks began. This family has lived though unbearable situations.

Their stories made us cry," McLean. "Still today, life is extremely difficult, not being able to work or go to school.

They are alive today thanks to their money saved up before they fled."

In the afternoon a family who participated in the first Christmas party hosted by the Canadians insisted that they come over for dinner. "The seven members of the Mansour family were extremely generous. The women began preparing the meal at seven in the morning. Everything was

homemade: kibbé, dolmas, olives and pitas."

The McLeans and the other Canadians in the group climbed Mount Nebo accompanied by the Babar family and their two daughters. It was a perfect day to profit from these happy moments together.

Later in the day the McLeans convinced the Barbars to allow themselves to float in the Dead Sea. "It was a unique moment, we all held each other's hands. We even convinced Raed who doesn't know how to swim to join us. He didn't regret it," says Paul McLean. He adds "The atmosphere was incredible. For the majority of the women and children it was their first outing in 18 months. The refugees go out very rarely because their security is constantly compromised."

The children's hearts were ready for Christmas. "We got the impression that we made them forget for a few hours their very difficult living conditions," says McLean.

"At our arrival, the family was impatiently waiting on their balcony. It was moving that they were so eagerly waiting on

their fourth-storey-balcony," recalls McLean. Even with the language barrier the children created very quick friendships with one another while colouring in books brought by the Canadians. The little Iraqi girls now have new friends.

Eight. This is the number

of documents that the McLean family has that could allow refugee families in Jordan to emigrate to Canada. They now invite churches, groups or families who wish to sponsor a refugee family to come forward. "I have the paperwork ready from eight other families. [These are] engineers, veterinarians, businessmen, truck drivers, all good people, who are ready to start their lives," said Paul McLean, in his interview "Listen to the Eastern Townships." The recording is available online via CBC Radio.

The trip is now coming to an end for the McLeans. Although they had hoped to come back on December 31 with the Barbar family they are sponsoring with their church, they will have to wait a little longer. "The Barbar family is expected to have an interview and medical appointment here in Amman at the embassy. These are the steps it takes before they can be approved," he summarizes.

Despite the beautiful moments over the past two weeks, the father is affected by what he saw during his trip. "It's sad in the sense that we see a lot of people who are in a situation that is not their choice, and that is not their fault," he says. "These are all new friends."



Cambodia trip expands church's global missions vision

In late October 2014, Pastor Garrett Holmes of Towers Baptist Church in Richmond, BC, was invited by one of his ministry partners to go on a vision trip to Phnom Penh, Cambodia. Pastor Garrett had been praying about an unreached people group that Towers could begin to engage. This seemed like a perfect opportunity to go see what God was doing in Southeast Asia.

After returning from the trip in early November 2014, Pastor Garrett shared with Towers what he saw God doing and the opportunities that his church could have in global missions. This global mission trip was put into the 2015 strategic plan of the church and the preparations for a September 2015 mission trip began.

Towers is a small church that is in the process of re-launching, so they knew that they would not be able to make this trip happen on their own. Richmond Chinese Baptist Church (a Cantonese-speaking church), which jointly owns the building that the two churches meet in, jumped in to help. After fundraisers, matching donations, and individual donations the trip was quickly funded. Pastor Garrett was overwhelmed by the generosity of the two churches to make this trip happen.

In September 2015, Pastor Garrett and four others from the church flew to Cambodia with crates of gifts and supplies. Several church members and the Richmond Chinese Baptist Church pastor met them at Vancouver International Airport. After praying and goodbyes they boarded their plane for an 18-hour flight. They met up with their partner church, First Baptist Church, Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, in Seoul, South Korea, for the final leg to Cambodia.

The team stayed in the city of Phnom Penh, but all of their mission work would be done in unreached mountain villages about four hours outside the city. Their base for ministry was the Home of Grace Orphanage. This orphanage was started about six years ago by a married couple from Vietnam. This couple laid the groundwork for the mission work that Towers would be a part of. They spent several months building relationships with villagers who had never seen Westerners.

Every day the team, which included Pastor Garrett's 14-year-old son, would load up in a van and serve a village church plant and share the Gospel with unreached villages through storytelling. Every day hundreds of people were hearing the Gospel for the first time and hundreds were giving their lives to Jesus Christ. By the end of the trip, approximately 600 Khmer villagers were saved by Jesus Christ. Several of these were exiles who fled during the Khmer Rouge regime from 1975–1979. Over 1.7 million Cambodians were killed under this regime, but those who escaped the genocide were now in these unreached mountain villages. The team had a chance to visit the prison and Killing Fields to help them better understand this important part of Cambodian history.

The team provided mosquito nets, bed mats, bags of rice, water and bread to these very primitive villages, and also spent many hours at the orphanage playing with the children and encouraging the staff, missionaries and local pastors.

On the last day, a celebration was held at the orphanage. The 600 new believers were invited to travel down to the orphanage to receive more supplies and to be baptized. Most of the new believers came for the celebration and almost 100 of them were baptized.

Pastor Garrett hopes that this is a long-term partnership for Towers Baptist Church. Another trip is planned for August 2016. It doesn't matter the size or situation your church is in. God has called every one of us to share the Gospel locally and globally; He has called us to obedience. Pastor Garrett is thankful for the four from his church who were obedient to the call. Lives on both sides of the globe were changed.

ristin Myers' husband, Brett, originally came to Alberta in 2012 to help with a soccer camp. As a result, God led the couple to Calgary to help plant Southwinds Church at Mahogany, which launched last year.

The summer she turned nine, Kristin came to know Jesus as her personal Lord and Saviour. She was blessed to grow up in a family who loved Jesus, loved her and taught her about God's love. "Even though I knew several Bible stories and never questioned that Jesus was God's Son, I hadn't taken the step to enter a personal relationship with

Him until my best friend returned from Vacation Bible School (VBS). She told me that she was a Christian; I told her that I was, too. When she asked if I had ever accepted Jesus personally I had to admit that I hadn't. Even though I knew about Jesus I didn't know Him vet." Kristin surrendered her life to Jesus just before she turned nine and was baptized shortly after.

In October 2004 she met her future husband. "His mom introduced him to me at church and he mentioned that he felt called to be a pastor, which really caught my attention because I had wanted to marry a pastor," she recalls. They were engaged in January and married on June 4, 2005. After being together for more than ten years, Kristin still considers her spouse her best friend and the love of her life. "He is the perfect balance for me," she says, "always so calm and steady." The couple have four daughters: Eden (6), Karis (4), Lydia (2) and Abigail (born a month ago).

"Our girls are such a blessing. Eden loves to read, perform, and make new friends. She has a passion for telling others about Jesus and learning more about Him. Creative Karis loves to take care of everyone, a peacemaker always ready to help. Lydia is happy and playful. She learned to walk (and climb) very early—and has kept us on our toes ever

since. Abigail is a sweet addition to our family. Her sisters were immediately eager to help with her and hold her."

Kristin is happiest when her family is together. "This year our family discovered that we enjoy camping," she says. "It's quality family time, and we always come home refreshed." Not only is camping a great relationship-building activity with other families, southern Alberta also has some of the most beautiful scenery the Myers family has ever seen.

Kristin spent most of her time in a science lab before she met Brett. She majored in chemistry and biology and was

accepted to pursue a PhD degree; she pursued teaching instead. Before they had children, she was a science teacher. "I really enjoyed studying creation and all the details God put into things that we usually miss," she says. Now she gets to share her love of nature with her own children.

Before Abigail's birth, Kristin was involved in children's ministry.

While she loves helping people grow, and enjoys focusing her whole attention on the one thing that makes an eternal difference in life, her favourite ministry in the church is working with kids. "The Bible is full of passages about how precious children are to God; I love serving Him by serving them. International Connections

From Russia back to Canada, Kelly and Jeanne Manire

Dear CNBC family and friends around the world,

It was only a little over three years ago, after serving in CNBC churches in Western Canada for 16 years, that our dear friends in the WestCoast Baptist Association prayed for us at their annual meeting and sent us off to serve our awesome God in Russia, as their missionaries.

We laboured in Russia, pouring everything we had into learning the language, loving the people, and serving in Russian Baptist churches. What an amazing three years it was, though admittedly the most challenging years of our lives.

Some of the highlights included serving on the lead Southern Baptist Engage Sochi Team, at the 2014 Russian Winter Olympics in Sochi, and serving alongside some of the greatest, most talented, most passionate for the Gospel missionaries we have ever worked with. We were also privileged to serve alongside the Moscow City Team, reaching as many Russians for Christ as we


could through a variety of creative outreach ministries.

God gave us fantastic relationships with those in our local church plant; these are friends for life! Honestly, it was a joy to mix it up with Russians, the vast majority of whom were not yet committed followers of Christ.

As our Russian language abilities improved, so did our effectiveness in sharing Christ, and going deep with our new Russian friends. In fact, by September 2015 we had hit our stride, strengthening daily in our language skills, seeing momentum in the ministries we were involved with, taking on more leadership across the Russian Cluster, and beginning to see new churches started in Moscow.

Perhaps that's why the announcement by the International

Mission Board to downsize our global missionaries by 600 to 800 in early September was such a shock. We did not see that coming, and we particularly did not see that the IMB's decision to offer early retirement to many of our missionaries would apply to us personally. After all, I'm only 50 years old, and Jeanne is only 43!



And so we agonized in prayer for most of September and October 2015. We asked God why He would move us when we were just beginning to reach our stride. The answer came early one Sunday morning. I woke up at 5 a.m. with the word "Jubilee" swimming in my mind. Immediately I went to the Word and started reading about the Year of Jubilee in Leviticus. It's all about returning home. forgiving debts, and celebrating God's goodness to us. I continued reading the Word, and the Lord continued to speak. Jeanne and I became convinced that the Lord was calling us back home to the Lower Mainland, and specifically to the Fraser Valley.

In November we made the decision to take the

Voluntary Retirement Incentive offered by the IMB, thus setting in motion our crazy plan to retire. We also began the process of being appointed as church planters with the North American Mission Board. As we were saying our goodbyes in Moscow, we were also beginning the process of dreaming about a strong, multiplying (new disciples, new leaders, and new churches throughout the Fraser Valley) and sustainable church plant in Abbotsford near University of the Fraser Valley.

We learned that the city of Abbotsford recently put a plan in place to create a new university district at UFV that will become similar to the new university communities at Simon Fraser University, and University of British Columbia.

She adds, "I'm not ignoring my responsibility as a follower of Christ to reach out to those outside my home, and I try to do that regularly, but my priority is leading my kids to know God and have a relationship with Him through Jesus Christ. I hope that I can encourage others at a similar stage in life to slow down (as Brett often tells me) and enjoy their families, and realize what a huge blessing children are."

On the topic of encouragement, Kristin tells of a precious lady at their last church (Corinth Baptist in Westminster, SC) named Mrs. Hilda, a childless widow. When they first met, she was in poor health—she could not drive and had a hard time walking—and was thus rarely able to attend church.

"In spite of her challenges, Mrs. Hilda was one of the most encouraging people I have ever met," says Kristin. "Anytime she would call she would focus on the positive things around her and how thankful she was. No matter what kind of day I was having, I always felt better after talking to her. She was also an incredible prayer warrior. At times when she would have trouble sleeping or feel lonely, she would spend time in prayer.

"She would pray for church, family, friends, and anything God brought to mind. She always sent encouraging cards exactly when I needed them. I would love to be able to encourage others like she did."

Kristin's prayer is to be so close to God that she can discern His call to reach out to others when they are in need,

> even when she is completely unaware of their circumstances. "I hope that when sleepless nights come (and there are many at this stage), my first place to turn is to God in prayer, not just for our family, but also for those around us."

1 Thessalonians 5:16-17 is how this busy mom and ministry partner wants to live her life: "Be joyful always, pray without ceasing." Kristin knows that things are not always easy,

but she believes joy is a choice as well as a heavenly gift: "I want others to see the joy I have because of Jesus and be drawn to Him." She concludes, "I also appreciate the challenge to pray continually; I get sidetracked easily, and it amazes me that God wants constant conversation with me as much as I need it with Him."

We also learned that approximately We also learned that approximately 200,000 Russian speakers live in Greater Vancouver, and the majority of those live in the Fraser Valley. During our first week back we were able to speak Russian with Russians in Abbotsford nearly every day!

Jeanne and I and our kids want to say thank you for the continued love and support you have shown us for many years. We proudly served as your missionaries in Russia. And now we proudly return home to Canada to continue to be your missionaries, this time in the Fraser Valley.

Creativity meets church planting challenges in Montreal

MONTREAL—There may be no city in North America that's more European than Montreal. The French-speaking province of Quebec is fiercely independent—independent to the point that Canada has faced referendums concerning possible secession.

Surrounded by English-speaking Canadian provinces and the United States, Montreal often feels the pressure of more dominant societies. So the city digs in and fiercely stands its ground to protect its culture—one that largely wants little to do with churches.

When Tony Silveira's family arrived in Montreal in 2006, the Portuguese native was not naive. After starting churches in Toronto for 12 years and assisting with efforts in Montreal, he knew challenges existed in an anti-religion city.

"In general, churches don't have a good reputation," Silveira said. "Religious words are curse words."

A city that he now says is against religion was once nicknamed "the city of 100 bell towers," evidenced by the presence of so many churches. Many were extraordinary cathedrals, some nearly 200 years old, with exquisite architecture. Today, most are empty on Sundays. Many of those bell-tower buildings are now tourist attractions.

Local governments have zoning laws that make locating churches on a main thoroughfare virtually impossible, which calls for creativity.

South Shore Community

Montreal's regional population of more than 5 million people (with the core city occupying an island, much like Manhattan) is bounded on the south by the St. Lawrence River. The South Shore community where Silveira is church planting has about 1.5 million residents.

While permits for churches in high-traffic areas are impractical, municipalities are anxious for commerce. Silveira found prime real estate that has an estimated 200,000 cars passing every day and started The Studio, a convention center venue for business seminars and meetings—and churches.

"It looks more like a Starbucks than a church," Silveira said. "It's cozy-not too big."

Creating a business center aligned with Silveira's objective to reach marketplace leaders and university students. Besides community and business events, the venue now hosts six churches, three of which he started. The Studio

doubles as a multi-congregational site. Each pays rent to make the location viable.

Research reflects Montreal's ambivalence toward Christianity. While some statistics say less than .5 percent are Christian, Silveira believes it's closer to 7 or 8 percent.

"The gospel is growing very fast here," he said.

That growth stems partly from youth rebellion, as teenagers and young adults often do the opposite of their parents during that stage of life.

"Millennials are where I see the best potential for growth," Silveira said. "Their parents are anti-church, and, naturally, when they go through the rebellious stages, they will look for church."

Churches Across Montreal

Silveira brought about 27 years of church planting experience to Montreal from his work in Europe and Toronto. But he knew nothing about the North American Mission Board (NAMB), Send North America or the farm system.

That knowledge changed when he met Jacques Avakian, NAMB's lead church planting catalyst for Quebec. Silveira's introduction to the farm system, NAMB's method for identifying and mentoring potential church planters, aligned with his vision and experience.

"I listened to his story and the vision God had given him," Avakian said. "I loved what I heard."

Meanwhile, Silveira was pleased to learn about what was already happening in Montreal.

"I was so touched by seeing the other church plants that NAMB has here," Silveira said. "The farm system was the first time I've ever heard about it. It's the best church planting model I've seen in the world.

"I started Passion Canada to mentor church planters," Silveira said of his registered ministry.

Passion Canada is the umbrella organization under which Silveira plants churches and mentors others. With The Studio, he's created a reproducible model.

"He is very creative," Avakian said. "His whole church planting strategy speaks for itself."

Silveira preaches at the 9:30 a.m. English multi-cultural service called The Church Unlimited. At 11:15 a.m., there's a French-speaking congregation called La 180 Zone. Then at 6:30 p.m., an English service called WeR1 (We Are One) has mostly youth and young adults. One of his protégés leads that service.

"I'm about to launch two other churches through the Passion Centre," said Silveira, who intended to start six new churches by the end of 2015. (He calls The Studio the Passion Centre when it's hosting churches.)

Meanwhile, he preaches every other week at a Mohawk First Nations church on the South Shore, and, when possible, he travels to Northern Quebec to minister to the Cree tribe.

The average giving of a Christian Quebec church member is \$7 per week, Silveira said, which necessitates the

business model he's chosen. His only other financial support comes from NAMB through the Cooperative Program (CP) and Annie Armstrong Easter



Offering® (AAEO) [North American Mission Offering in Canada].

"Without the CP and AAEO, I would not be where I am now," Silveira said.

That stability also allows him to plan proactively.

"My vision is to multiply what we have here," Silveira said. "I don't see that the next generation wants a mega church. What I foresee is opening multiple locations where 300 people can still do community.

The next generation also isn't likely to want bell towers, preferring a simpler organic church model built on user-friendly evangelism, discipleship and fellowship.

"I would like to expand the model with different flavors and styles of churches in different regions of Montreal."

The goal for the 2016 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering across North America is \$70 million. The CNBC contributes to that goal through the North American Mission Offering.
