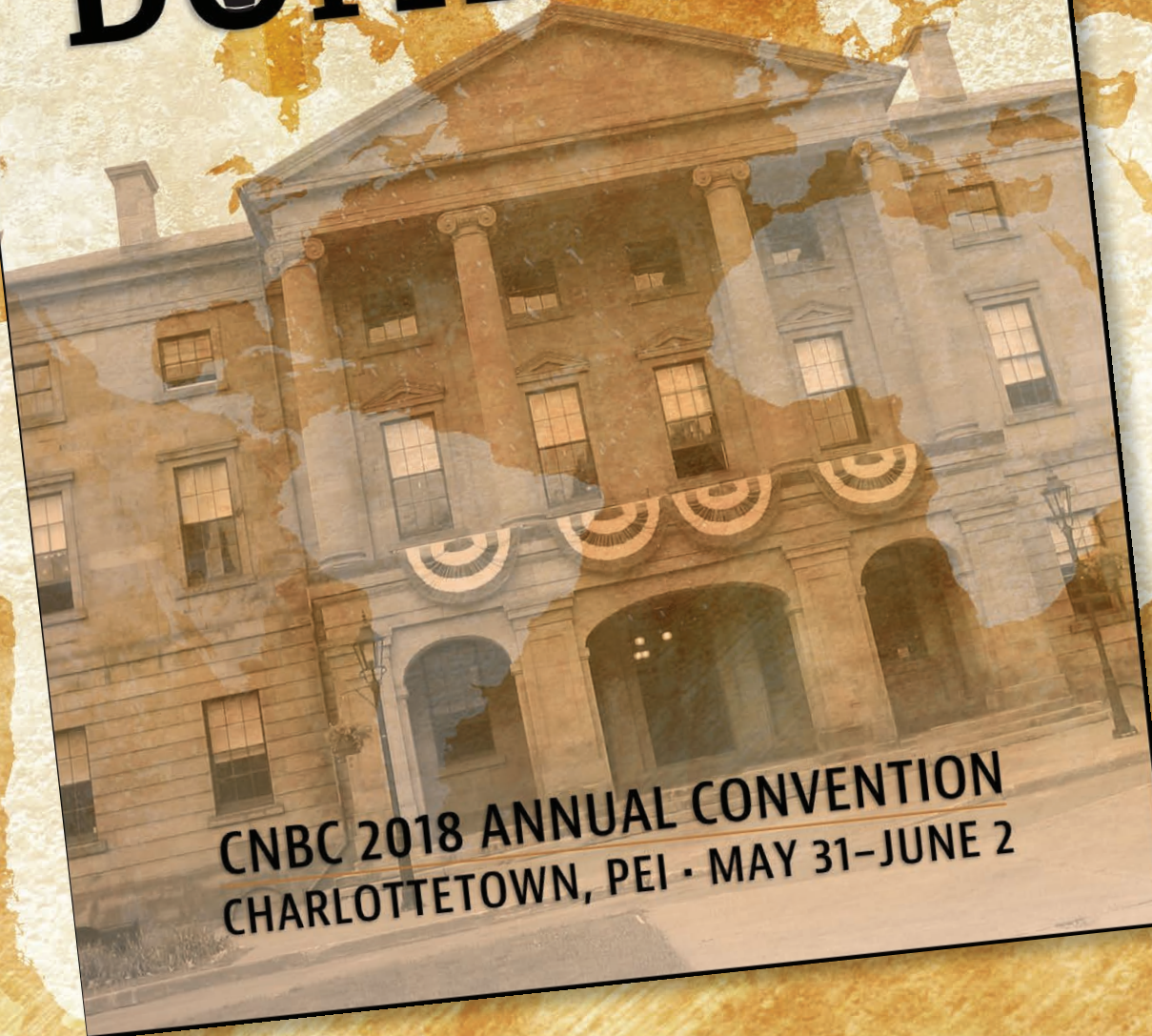

Connecting

Increased Giving, Healthy Growth and Change

The CNBC is on a positive trajectory and the movement is healthy and growing. This year we have experienced growth in every region in Canada and our expectation is that this is just the beginning of a period of rapid acceleration and further increase.

We want to say “thank you” to our leaders and churches for their continuing and increasing generosity through the [Cooperative Program](#). In 2017, we saw increases in giving to the Cooperative Program nationally of over \$40,000 more than the previous year. This set a new record in the CNBC for the largest amount ever given through the Cooperative Program in one year. Along with national giving, we were able to send back to our regional associations the largest amount ever invested in our regional ministries.

Last year was a great year for church planting. There are 35 new churches that are part of our family of churches, many of which are growing at a rapid pace. Coming alongside these new churches are a number of supportive processes and training as a result of our partnership with the North American Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. We are seeing more

new churches grow and flourish than ever before, and fewer unsuccessful churches.

Last year we implemented a new strategy and structure so we could maximize our cooperation and effectiveness in our regional associations. That reorganization has been successful and reports so far are positive and encouraging. Our hope is to continue to improve our regional relationships and increase our cooperation together.

This year we will add two new regions to this initiative. CNBC Québec and CNBC Manitoba will join CNBC Atlantic, CNBC Ontario, CNBC Saskatchewan and CNBC Alberta. This new partnership with our CNBC regions has enabled us to add new field positions called the “regional ministry leader.” This ministry position works with both our national and regional organizations to minister to all of our churches in each CNBC region. We have currently filled four regional ministry leader positions and expect to fill three more in the next few months.

Our Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary & College (CSBS&C) is experiencing a time of increased growth with

some of the largest incoming classes in a number of years. Our school continues to add opportunities to study and train for ministry by increasing course offerings and degree programs. Ministry students can choose from a wide variety of graduate and undergraduate programs that range from one year to a full master of divinity degree.

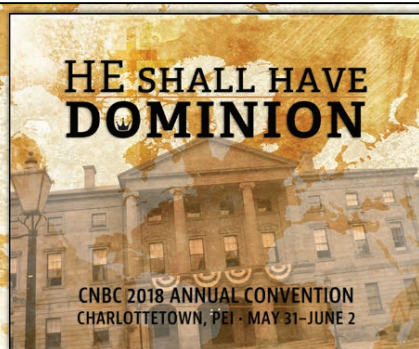
In addition to the diversity of programs, students are offered courses that can be taken on-site, by live telecast off-site with class interaction, on the internet, and even occasionally at an off-campus venue. Our seminary has made every effort to serve our churches across Canada and stands ready to help us effectively train the next generation of CNBC leaders.

All of these advances and successes have come to our family of churches as a result of the graciousness of God. He has blessed us far beyond what we could ever have deserved and we are sure to give Him the glory for all He has done. Our trust in Him needs to be unwavering and our confidence that He holds the CNBC in His hands gives us every reason to be positive about our future as a movement that God will use to impact our nation and the world.

South Asians Standing Out for the Lord Jesus in BC

SURREY, BC—With more than 175,000 of its population speaking the North Indian languages of Punjabi, Hindi, and Urdu, Surrey has become the West Coast hub of all things South Asian: amazing curries, local Indian specialty grocery stores, record-setting Vaisakhi parades and Diwali celebrations.

While most of the 300,000 South Asians in the Greater Vancouver/Abbotsford area worship at the many Sikh gurdwaras, Hindu mandirs and Muslim mosques, there are a growing number of South Asian followers of the Lord Jesus who are worshipping

in their own languages in South Asian churches, too.

One of those is a Canadian National Baptist Convention church plant. [South Asian Community Church](#) launched in September 2016. With an average regular attendance of 30 people from Christian, Sikh, Muslim and Hindu backgrounds, the church is making its presence known in the community.

One of the fledgling church's flyers says they promote love and respect for God and all people, welcome and invite all to know the Lord Jesus, and desire to serve all by the Holy Spirit. These words resonate with spiritually-inclined South Asians.

South Asian Church's two most recent events, South Asian Christmas and New Year's Celebration, were hailed by one as "great times of fellowship" for Punjabi, Hindi and Urdu speakers, where newcomers felt appreciated and could come to know more about the Lord Jesus.

The new church is led by Pastor Shahid Kamal and his wife Maroofa, both from

the Punjab state of Pakistan. Their four children are also a key part in the ministry as they connect easily with other South Asian youth. The family has done what many see as a very difficult job, which is to bridge the distrust gap between Indians and Pakistanis—traditional enemies—and gather them into one congregation bound by the love of God.

"Our mission statement is, 'Together loving God and all people,'" Kamal said. "That's what we always recognize. We are trying to accomplish God's work through this."

Reaching all people, for Kamal, has meant going where the need is the greatest. For him, it meant leaving a familiar place—Toronto with its even larger South Asian Christian community, where he had lived since 2012 when he immigrated to Canada—to come to Surrey. That's when his family was able to join him.

"When I heard there was a large population of South Asians in Surrey and

there was a need to plant a church, God put this need in our heart," Kamal said. For a year, he had been going through the interview and evaluation process to become a NAMB church planter.

"I am so thankful for this opportunity to be a part of the North American Mission Board and to have their help to do the work God has called me to do," Kamal said.

God had also been preparing Surrey for the Kamals. Several people at Royal Heights Baptist Church in Delta, across the highway from Surrey, had been praying for a greater outreach to South Asians in the area. One family, the Ingolds, became some of the Kamals' first friends and partners in Surrey and together they began doing Bible studies in South Asian homes. Whole families became interested in the Lord Jesus.

After less than three months of home Bible studies, the first worship service took place September 4, 2016, in the Royal Heights church basement. South Asian Church has continued to meet there ever since. Thirty-five South Asian people came to that first service, and Punjabi worship, preaching, praying,

and celebrating with delectable Indian food was all there too.

Some highlights for the church's first year included a nearly snowed-in Christmas celebration—but still, 80 Asians came!—plus three energetic short-term teams from churches and youth groups making friends with many in the community, whole church outreach trips to Harrison Hot Springs and to a local mosque, and even sharing food with the homeless in Surrey.

The church has regular meetings as well: Sunday morning worship, Sunday evening family fellowship, Wednesday prayer and Bible study and Friday youth gatherings, but the pastor's wife notes that "much of the ministry is phone calls, counselling, and hosting and going to each other's homes."

This personal contact is where real friendship and fellowship is found with South Asians, Kamal said.

The pastor and his wife help newcomers begin their faith in Lord Jesus by matching them with members who can help them and teach them how to be disciples of Jesus. With this, the church had five baptisms in 2017 and wants to keep reaching out.

Kamal wants to make more of an effort to reach out to unreached people.

Already he has arranged for three teams of short-term workers to help next summer with outreach activities that might include block parties, sports camps, neighbourhood visitation, prayer walks and more.

"We want more mission teams and more churches," Kamal said. "As many as we can connect with, for growing God's Kingdom."

Pastor Kamal and the young church have a bold vision for the area called "The Fruiticana Challenge." Fruiticana is a large chain of 14 stores, carefully placed where South Asians can easily go and buy their unique groceries.

The pastor wondered, "What about us? Can't we at least have 14 strong CNBC churches among the 300,000 Punjabis to bring the Gospel of our Lord Jesus in close reach for them?"

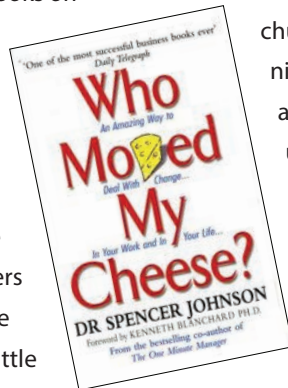
Find new, more effective ways to work towards what is truly important

One of my favourite books on change is *Who Moved My Cheese?* by Spencer Johnson. Johnson introduces to the reader his fable on how to cope positively with change. The story involves four characters who live in a maze: the mice Scurry and Sniff, and two “little people,” Hem and Haw. All is going well because they have found a huge source of their favourite food: cheese. But when their source of cheese goes missing, the four characters must all decide how to deal with this change. Should they keep doing the same thing they’ve always done, looking for cheese in the same places? Or should they move on and adopt new strategies to achieve their ultimate goal?

Over the past year and a half, several changes have restructured the relationships between the CNBC and our regional associations. As of the beginning of 2018, Atlantic Canada, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Northern Alberta and Southern Alberta have all adopted this restructuring.

This might be a good time to remind ourselves what the “cheese” is for CNBC churches and how important it is to “keep moving with the cheese.”



What we long for is to see lives transformed by the power of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Figuring out how churches can better communicate, cooperate, coordinate, and champion what unifies us, and remember what we have in common is what Johnson refers to as “preparing for the cheese to move.” We are working to find new, more effective ways to work towards what is truly important.

Many of these changes focus on fostering more effective communication within the CNBC, between the national and regional associations as well as

congregations. These are just a few of the ways that the new structure streamlines communication within the CNBC.

An example of how these restructuring changes have already created deeper communication within the CNBC can be found in CNBC Southern Alberta, where pastors and leaders gather monthly to pray together, share God stories, eat lunch and gain insights into becoming more effective leaders. While together, they discover how the Father is at work in their churches and

how best to pray for each other. Another group of pastors meets weekly to discuss the following three questions: 1) What has God said to you this week?

2) What are you doing about what He said? 3) What is one ministry challenge that we might need to process together? Similar gatherings are occurring at The Round Table with CNBC Ontario pastors. They are all experiencing a deeper sense of accountability and encouragement.

It is our prayer that as the CNBC, regional associations and local churches continue to adapt to these changes, we will experience greater communication to strengthen our work towards our common goal.

Meet Grace Baptist Church

AIRDRIE, AB— [Grace Baptist Church](#), in Airdrie, Alberta, is the one of the newest members of the CNBC family. Airdrie is a small city located north of Calgary within the Calgary-Edmonton corridor. Airdrie is the eighth-largest community in Alberta with a population of over 65,000. Over the past five years Airdrie has been one of the fastest growing communities in Alberta with an annual growth rate of 7.48 percent.

Grace Baptist began in November 1978 when a small group from Crossfield Baptist Church in Crossfield, Alberta, began meeting regularly in Airdrie for worship services and then organized as a local Baptist church in 1979. Airdrie Grace Baptist Church was incorporated

in February 1988 and that September, a dedication service was held for the newly completed building at their current location. Over the years, the church building has been added on to and renovated. Today, the congregation of approximately 250 meets in two services on Sunday mornings and is about to celebrate their 30th anniversary as a church!

At Grace, they are about the [mission](#) of “Connecting to God, to One Another and to Our Community.” Grace values biblical teaching and being family-centred through their Sunday morning services and excellent Grace Kids program, [Grace Women](#) and [Grace Men](#) Connection Breakfasts and [Life Groups](#) that meet during the week. Grace also values reaching out to their community through monthly [Connect Events](#), which provide

This year, Grace is focused on moving people forward in their walk with Christ through their “Take a Step” focus and getting to know the CNBC family better. Pastor Michael Nedelko (BA, MDiv, DMin), Grace Baptist’s senior pastor since 2001, says, “As a church, we are excited to have taken the

My parents didn't have a clue about any social media platforms and had some interest and lots of questions.

I did my best to explain to them what is going on in cyberspace using language I thought they would understand. My dad and mom just didn't get it. After a long discussion, my dad's conclusion was he would just pick up the phone and call anyone he wanted to connect with.

My daughters then suggested we should buy my parents an iPad for Grandpa's upcoming birthday. Maybe

it would be best for them to learn through "hands-on" experience. The girls were willing to teach Grandpa and Grandma to "Facetime." They tried to convince them that this would be a great way to stay connected with the grandchildren and great-grandchildren. My parents had a good belly laugh and then, in unison, gave us a

firm no to the idea. They concluded it would be impossible to learn at their age.

While we were talking, my dad shared a few of his observations with me. He said, "When I go out, I notice everyone is always looking down, checking a device. People rarely have time for a conversation with strangers because they are on their phones." He has a very different perspective from me but there is some truth to what he has observed. I am online every day.

My parents can't be bothered with the internet and social media. I can't live without it! When the Wi-Fi went down at our resort during our Christmas vacation and I couldn't text the other members of our group, I almost

panicked. When the internet goes down at work I am lost.

Times have changed and different generations certainly do have different perspectives. My ten grandchildren are growing up in a world that is very different from the world my parents were raised in.

Is it possible that the constant lure of the digital world seems to keep people from being fully present?

As I begin my new role as team leader for CNBC Women I want to be present online and in person. I will be creating and gathering resources for women in our churches. Using the internet facilitates sharing of ideas and helps us as we do ministry in many regions across our great country. I can meet with leaders from British Columbia to Newfoundland using an online platform. At the same time, I am very aware of the value of sitting face to face with women and making connections. I will always look forward to sitting in a room with women and asking how they are doing in life and ministry. Online will never completely replace face to face. Pray for me as I begin with a desire to equip and reach women of all generations across Canada.

The Emotionally Healthy Planter: Family

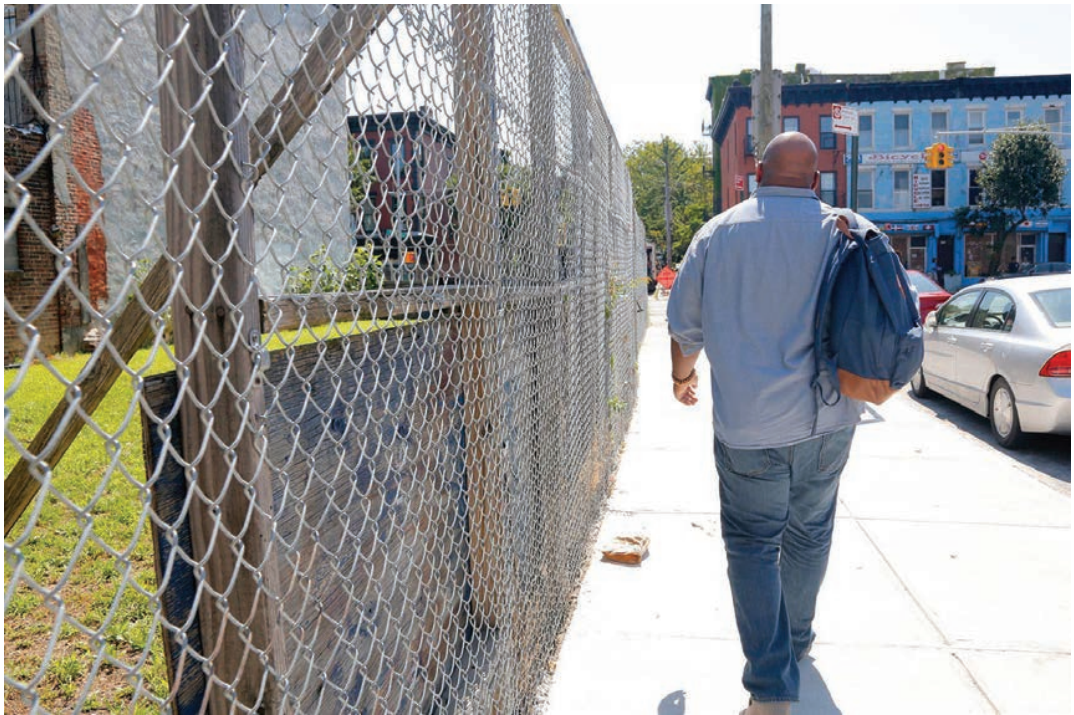

Where'd that come from?

We've probably all asked this question from time to time. Something happens in our home and our spouse responds in a way we don't understand or appreciate. After our initial shock, we begin to dig into where this response came from. Maybe our spouse spent the entire day disciplining unruly kids and was already frustrated when we walked in the door. Maybe there was a phone call with a friend that was annoying and she's still simmering in anger. Or, maybe we did something the night before that led to unresolved tension.

Whatever the cause, it's clear that none of our actions happen in a vacuum. We are always influenced by something. Some of our influences might be temporary and fleeting (like the phone call above), whereas others are long-lasting and permanent.

Everyone comes into adulthood, and specifically into church planting, as a product of our home of origin. These early influences—both positive and negative—shape our responses to our present circumstances in ways we are prone to overlook or minimize. Our background predisposes us to certain default reactions to life that may help

or hinder our effectiveness in God's mission. Let's quickly consider a few common ways our family of origin can shape our present actions.

People Pleasing—Driven by a desire to prove that you have worth and value that you did not feel as a child, you never say “no” and live in a desperate attempt to prove you are loveable.

Fear of Man—Growing up in an authoritarian environment, you cower in fear of the perceptions of others and always fear that you are going to blow it.

Anger—Your parents battled daily so you explode when you don't get your way and struggle to develop God-honouring, mature ways of responding to conflict.

Isolation—Your home was filled with secrets—the kind everyone knew but no one talked about—so you've

learned to bury your feelings and keep everyone at arm's length.

Anxiety—You watched your home unravel, so you live with a constant fear that—regardless of how blessed you feel in the moment—it's all going to fall apart soon.

The list could go on and on. No one has a perfect past and no one is immune to the shaping influence this past has on our present. It's likely that those who are close to us ask the question: “Where'd that come from?” on a fairly regular basis and, given a bit of introspection on our part, we could point them to our home of origin for the answer.

Since these influences are ubiquitous, we all have one of two responses to our past. We can simply put our head down and push forward into the future

D52: A Night of Romance

In November, [The Pathway Church](#) in Calgary hosted an event to develop friendships with acquaintances we had just met. This was an opportunity for us to invite new friends to see our church in a cool, creative way.

The event was called A Night of Romance. Each couple from our church that attended had to bring a lost couple to the event. It was designed to get couples to spend an evening of romance together. Each had their own table with a romantic flair, a red rose and seven words to help them communicate and express their feelings as a couple. We prepared a four-course meal. As the couples ate, with romantic soft music in the background, they were asked to start the conversation by finishing a sentence about each word.

- **LOVE:** I feel loved when you ...
- **TRUST:** I gain trust when you ...
- **FORGIVENESS:** Forgive me for ...
- **JOY:** You bring joy to my life when you ...
- **RESPECT:** I feel respected when you ...
- **PATIENCE:** Thank you for being patient with my ...
- **COMMITMENT:** I commit to make our marriage better by ...

After the meal and conversation time, there was a concert by a Latin jazz band. Four professional musicians were hired. Two were not Christians; they came with their wives and participated in the program.

The couples were blessed. During the music time, we connected with

non-believers. We built relationships and now we are in the process of the post-event: meeting on a regular basis. Five couples came to church and one accepted Christ so far. The Gospel was presented during the follow-up when we invited the couples to get together again in our home. After an event like this, they say yes to express their gratitude.

We do this to build relationships, to preach the Gospel and to be light to other couples.

As we said goodbye after the dinner, one of the friends we've been connecting with said: "Thank you for putting this together for us. It's been a long time since we had a night of romance; you are all good people." A wife sent this text to my phone: "I cannot say enough about how amazing it was. The two couples I invited absolutely loved it! The entire thing from decorations to food, environment and entertainment was just done well. Probably one of the best events I've ever been to targeted to couples. My friend came to church

this Sunday and loved it. She invited her mom. My husband and I hung out with the couple and we invited them this weekend again."

This is relational evangelism:

DEVOTE your life to praying for the lost on a weekly basis

DIRECT your life to community

DEVELOP new friendships, inviting them to well-developed events, following up in order to

DECLARE the Gospel

Invite them to church and **DISCIPLE** those you reach

Not Finished Yet!

Jesus Christ has given us a mission until He returns. The Apostle Paul reminds us of the Great Commission and calls all young people across Canada to "Put our hope in the living God ... Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young, but set an example in speech, in life, in love, in faith and in purity. Devote yourself to the public reading of Scripture, to preaching and to teaching" (1 Timothy 4:9–13 NIV).

In 2 Timothy 4:2a and 5b he says, "Preach the Word; be prepared in season and out of season ... endure hardship, do the work of an evangelist...."

Paul knew that in order to start a movement throughout the Mediterranean, that extended to Rome and to Spain, he needed young believers to take action, to passionately participate in the spreading of the Gospel until Jesus returns. We are not finished yet! All of Canada and the world needs to have a chance to hear and respond to the Gospel.

If we are aiming to plant 1,000 churches by 2020, we need our youth to be part of the vision. We need to invest in the next generation. We need young leaders to take the flag of the Gospel and plant it in the tough places: universities, high schools, at work, in the neighbourhood, from house to

house, from one friend to another.

As pastors and national leaders of the CNBC, we need to encourage young leaders to come to our seminary in Cochrane. We need to let them lead and bring new ideas, so they may grow in their calling, so God will use them to teach even when they make mistakes.

God is using our youth:

ROOTS church in Calgary served overseas and took the Gospel, this past

Christmas, to places where there is persecution.

Youth from Vancouver

Chinese Baptist Church have led camps and served in Guatemala.

Youth leader, Frank Aular at Emmanuel Baptist Church in Toronto, decided to end an entertainment mentality in the youth ministry. He challenged the young people to own missions, to devote their lives to the Scriptures and prepare themselves for ministry in order to take the Gospel to the ends of the earth. They accepted the challenge by starting to attend our Southern Baptist Seminary in Cochrane this semester.

Martin Luther King Jr once said, "I have a dream!"



I also have a dream, that our youth will take over this country and stand firm with boldness and perseverance in order to take the Gospel out of our churches, out of our offices, out of our homes—and bring Canada into our churches!

This year I have a dream! That we will begin a YET campaign, a Youth Evangelism Team that will be trained to develop events that gather lost people to hear and respond to the Gospel in every region of our CNBC.

We need the new Billy Grahams of the next generation; we need to develop young men and women who are fearless with the Gospel. I once asked a young girl on a mission trip in Venezuela, "How does it feel to go into the streets to preach the Gospel to strangers?" She stood up and shouted with her young 15-year-old voice, "Here, evangelism is not something we talk about; it is something we do. Come, join us tomorrow and you will find out!"

Let's talk less and go more because we are not finished yet!





Christmas in Antakya

The adventure started last July when the president of Canadian Global Response (CGR) asked if I would take a team to Antakya in December to model Christmas with a Purpose. "And where is that?" I asked politely. South Turkey. Close to the Syrian border. Biblical Antioch. "How many should I take?" Seven, a vanload.

Seven of us went over Christmas to ROOTS's fourth and most challenging

Remember the Poor project to Europe and the Middle East. I pastor ROOTS, the English congregation of Truth.

Antakya. Followers of Jesus were first called Christians there. The Gentiles flooded into the Kingdom. The Antioch church launched the first outreach team. Barnabas and Saul teamed up. It's a wonderful part of our heritage.

Ten years ago, the city population was 200,000. It's now twice the size because of Syrian refugees.

Our team, myself and a local leader partnered with believers in Antakya at one of the few Protestant churches in Turkey with a building. The pastoral couple had to learn two new languages (Turkish and Arabic). They now function in four. We grew to love them, these church-planting heroes of ours.

Our Remember the Poor ROOTS team had two goals: encourage the Christians and care for Syrian refugees.

Rick Warren's motto compelled us, "Use your influence and affluence to help those who have none." We did.

I preached four times, including twice on New Year's Eve Sunday in Antakya. The church has two humble congregations, perhaps 25 each. God's redeemed ones, lights in the darkness. Our team encouraged and loved them—our Christmas gift to them.

At one point on the trip, our team met four high school girls who wanted to practise English and were curious about Christianity. It's what we wanted to do: show the love of Jesus to anyone interested.

We raised nearly \$10,000 in our refugee fund. We visited refugees, distributed clothes we brought from Canada, gave out food hampers and bought coal for them. We did what we could. We visited families in their modest homes. One man was living in an abandoned house. We went to refugee camps close to the Syrian border. We saw poverty and trauma close up and personal.

Midweek we sat outside for dinner, guests of a church elder in a Christian village in the countryside. I was to preach there that evening. The Syrian border was three kilometres away—we could see the fences. As we ate, we heard bombs exploding. Unnerving.

There has been a movement of God among Syrian refugees in the last five years. It's wonderful to see how many have started to follow Jesus. We heard amazing, miraculous stories from refugees who have found hope and healing.

Results? We were all stretched by the commitment of Christian workers in hard places. We showed love to "the least of these, my brethren," as King Jesus told us. One of our team members said, "I am getting addicted to



these projects." Our handler told us it was the best team ever.

Where was the movement of God last century? China, for sure. This century? Some say it's among Muslims. If that's true, you want to be part of it. Your church must be part of it, because it's God's work in our generation. What will you do?

Will next Christmas be same old, same old for you? What about Christmas with a Purpose? Intrigued? Talk to [CGR](#) and give to their projects.

On Mission Through Prayer, Worship and Scripture

Let's go on a journey together.

Imagine with me, if you will, that you are boarding a flight with me and my teammates. We are on a plane but this journey will fly us not just over land and water, but back in time.

We will go to a pre-modern world. A world where treatable diseases are curses, where cures are found in the offering of the right sacrifices, to the right statue, in the right building, on the right day, in the right posture, while wearing the right colours. A mistake in any of these details will nullify the effectiveness of the cure and the curse will continue. A mistake in any of these details is likely what led to the curse in the first place, because you are only ill, or poor, or unemployed, or single, or barren because you failed in one of these details on a previous visit, festival or day-to-day act of worship. The gods are easily angered; precision, dedication and extravagance in your sacrifices is the only chance you have

to appease them and hope to stay on the right side of their capricious nature.

These are the people that some of our IMB workers serve and this is the world in which they live. My teammates and I will remain anonymous for their protection. You will have to trust me that, this summer, we actually went to a region that will also not be named. But we did go and we did serve, and here are three truths we saw our Lord and Saviour emphasize for us while we were there.

The battle we engage in is not against flesh and blood but against powers and principalities in the heavenly realms. Much of our service was in praying with the workers, reading scripture alongside them and singing worship together to God in the very places where for generations the mountains have been dedicated to the worship of false gods. The friends we have there who serve day after day, year after year, have become convinced that they see so little fruit because we do not claim our Lord's victory and power in these Spiritual battles. We went to fight, not with weapons or physical prowess but with prayer, worship and scripture.

People are our purpose, never our enemies. Of course, the people we met from the region were all engaged in the support and defence of the evil worship system that we went to oppose. However, even the priests of that religion are not our enemies; they are trapped, enslaved and held captive by our true enemy. We went to proclaim the release of the captives, to bring sight to the blind, not to oppose

them personally. We found warmth and welcome in the homes of people who also daily engaged in the worship of other gods, and we extended gifts and love to them as well.

Every time we faced an obstacle, God took care of us: miraculously restoring health to the sick; changing the weather, because of course He invented weather; helping us find lost things; and helping us find lost souls looking for hope. We are so grateful to the family of churches that supported our desire to go. We are grateful for the generous gifts that support those who serve full-time. We are grateful to those who have heard our stories of what God did there with joy. We are grateful that God used us to serve.

2006 seminary grad plants churches in Alaska

A burly bear hunter who works in the oil fields on Alaska's North Slope is one of four church planters Jim Boyd mentors as he was mentored during his time from 2002 to '06 at the [Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary](#).

Boyd has planted three churches in the last three years, each of which initially met in his home in Soldotna on south-central Alaska's Kenai Peninsula.

The team he has gathered also ministers in two remote Native villages and Boyd is building trust with Native Alaskans in his additional role as a radio personality on Voice for Christ ministries, part of the I Am radio network.

"We are a product of the Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary," Boyd said, including his vocalist wife Stephanie, a gifted musician, and their five now nearly-grown children in his statement. "We were trained for tough places and that is exactly where God has us.

"I am so thankful for the professors who discipled me at the seminary," the church planter continued. "They taught me to love like Jesus, that lost sheep mattered, and to give my life away so others might know Christ."

Life can be tenuous in Alaska, Boyd said.

"Multiple ministry colleagues striving to make disciples here in Alaska have died trying," Boyd continued. "Earlier

this fall a missionary pilot crashed into the Yukon River and died after getting disoriented in heavy fog. Last winter a ministry partner and his family crashed into a lake when ice formed on the wing of their small plane."

Nonetheless, God keeps calling people to minister on the far side of the continent, west of Canada's Yukon Territory, Boyd said.

"What I intentionally do is pray that God will bring to us entrepreneurs for God," acknowledged the man, who is in his third stint as a church planting missionary with the North American Mission Board. He started Tapestry, a church in Calgary, two churches in Southern California when he went there to care for aging parents, and an additional three so far in Alaska.

Men with "a heart for the lost and an entrepreneurial bent" seem to find their way to him, Boyd said. Men like this enjoy the challenge of starting something from nothing. "They come alive doing it."

Alaskans learn to rely on their own strength and endurance

Alaska is a land of untamed beauty and its people—Native Alaskans and others drawn to a frontier land—have learned to rely on their own strength and endurance, Boyd said. They live in isolated communities, scattered fishing villages, and small towns. Soldotna is one of the largest, with a little over 4,000 residents. The entire Kenai Peninsula has an estimated 55,000 people, recent census records show.

Another number is 41. That's the number of people on the Kenai Peninsula who have been baptized by Boyd during the last three years.

"One computer programmer and his family were living in a camper," Boyd said. "We led them to Christ, their kids too. That family is now fully integrated into their church family."

Boyd's skill set is that of a catalyst, the church planter said. He works with an apprentice lay-leader to establish the new work until the "apprentice" becomes the pastor.

"Everywhere Jim goes, he or one of his kids lead people to the Lord," said Butch Strickland, a NAMB church planting catalyst in Chugach Baptist Association on the Kenai Peninsula. "Evangelism, discipleship and church planting, that's all they ever think."

One of the ways Boyd has made inroads to Native communities is by

partnering with Child Evangelism Fellowship and coaching their Good News Clubs. He and his family were recently invited by village elders in Quinhagak to lead a club in their village four times a year.

"The Lord opened a door from that," Boyd said. Native Alaskan communities gather each year for communal "sings." Boyd and his family—four teenage sons and a daughter—were asked to provide Good News Clubs during those events.

Boyd described the "great tension" he has seen in tribal villages, which at first glance appear to be "a third world country." Barefoot kids will be talking on cell phones. Next to a broken-down building will be a satellite dish that brings glimpses of a world villagers might otherwise never imagine.

driven by these unseen, undiscussed influences. Unfortunately, if we choose this alternative, the sin that clings so closely will form a toxic concoction with our past and lead us into all sorts of foolishness.

The other option is to bring these influences to the forefront of our daily pursuit of sanctification and submit them to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. The grace of God is sufficient, not simply for our volitional rebellion from God's commands, but also for the host

of influences to propel us in that direction. Like all sin patterns, we need to learn to bring our past out of the darkness and into light.

This starts with us, personally, identifying the myriad of ways we are personally shaped by our past—particularly our family of origin. The more accurate we are at naming these influences, the more likely we will be to impede their negative effect on our walk with Christ and our love of others. Then, we learn

to recognize these shaping influences before they propel our actions so we can call to mind God's truth and redi-

rect these forces by the power of God's Spirit. We'll never fully escape the influence of our past, but we can, and we must, learn to recognize and redirect them as we seek to love and lead others.

"Village elders don't want to lose their culture," Boyd said. "But their youth ... want the future. There is great tension because technology gives them aspirations that can't be met.

"The key to reaching the villages is reaching the youth," Boyd continued.

"And through Good News Clubs and the multi-community sings, God is giving us a platform with the youth."

Boyd's professors and others he met at the Canadian Southern Baptist Seminary helped develop Boyd and his passion for growing God's Kingdom, said Jim Hamilton, executive director

of Barnabas Ministries, a parachurch organization that spans Alaska and northwest Canada.

Boyd's skill in reaching others, then discipling them as they become leaders in their own right, is how "Jim's just getting the job done," Hamilton said. "He's a quiet leader who has impact."
